I was reading an article recently that reported nine out of ten of us feel stressed every day. The survey of over 2,000 adults showed that we deal with stress in very different ways and the most popular method of de-stressing was the simple act of having a cup of tea, a much more popular choice than yoga or meditation. The article went on to describe 27 ways to calm down to lower cortisol, heart rate and tension in our body and of these, the top ten were:

- 1. Curl up with a good book it can lower your heart rate in six minutes
- 2. Have a 'podcast walk' listening to a Ted talk helps you switch off
- 3. Go for a 15 minute run it can lower stress levels by 87 per cent
- 4. Put the kettle on tea contains an amino acid to relax you
- 5. Put ice packs on your face or neck slows your heart rate
- 6. Listen to loud music it helps the brain to process emotions
- 7. Chew gum for ten minutes to lower your cortisol levels
- 8. Hands in the air dancing stimulates the vagus nerve
- 9. Do some gardening several times a week
- 10. Eat a teaspoon of Marmite on toast to lower your brain's stress response Another report, published last November, showed that attending church regularly makes you happier and more optimistic about the future. The research, conducted by the Institute for the Impact of Faith in Life (IIFL) showed that more than eight in ten people who go to a place of worship at least once a week reported being happy, compared to just half of those who never attended a religious service. More than 2,000 adults across the UK were surveyed and over 70 per cent said that their faith was important to their identity and they reported having "good psychological wellbeing" compared to less than half of atheists. Among those with a strong attachment to God, more than three quarters said they were confident in handling life's challenges. Across the survey, people who attended church services also reported higher levels of self-control, better psychological wellbeing and more satisfaction with their lives than others. While it may be considered unfashionable and outdated, I believe that attending church can be the greatest de-stressor of all.

At this time of year especially, as we are longing for the winter to end and as new life is appearing all around us in the fields and in the gardens, we also have the promise of the new life that Easter offers. At Church we will remember that Jesus, through his death and resurrection has come to set us free from our sins, our guilt and our anxiety. And if that doesn't de-stress us, I don't know what will!

#### AN OLD STORY WITH A NEW TWIST

A few years ago I enjoyed giving a talk in St.George's Church about the brass of Sir Adam De Clifton which is displayed in the north aisle. What intrigued me was why the brass of a knight who was born in Buckenham, died in 1367, and had no connection with Methwold whatsoever, should be buried in our church. There were lots of possibilities to be considered but none of them appeared to provide any plausible answer. Recently I decided to make a journey to Old Buckenham (near Aldborough) to see if there was any evidence in the very old and beautiful local church. Old Buckenham today is a lovely village with a huge green at its centre which is surrounded by a pub, schools and houses old & new. It didn't take long in the church to find a genealogy of the De Clifton family which read —

"The de Clifton family was an important family in England. The first de Clifton came over with William the Conqueror and was given estates in Nottinghamshire; his descendants being the Sheriffs of Nottingham among other high offices. ..... Osbert (Adam) de Cailly was Lord of Buckenham Castle in the late 13th Century. His daughter Margery (or Margaret) married Roger de Clifton – linking the two important families together. Their son Adam de Clifton was born in Buckenham castle in about 1308. The Cailly family remained important in the history of the area; John de Cailly was Sheriff of Norfolk in 1334-1335."

Unfortunately, apart from one or two mentions of Sir Adam's grandsons, there was nothing else! So the mystery continues ... and yet there is hope! At the back of the Church guidebook there were links to "The Friends of Merton Priory" (which the Clifton family endowed with money and where Sir Adam may originally have been buried) and to the Parish Council & the local history group. Having left my contact details I have had a telephone call & an email from them already and they are going to report back on the evidence that is held in the village. I can't wait for the reply or to write it up in next month's Methwold Times! Chris Stone

#### Councillor Tom Ryves. KLWNBC

I thought I would like to share this interesting article on the dynamics of defeating an inappropriate application for a factory farm, finally decided in June 2023. The article is based on newspaper reports

in the Shropshire Star. The moral I get from this is that where a council grants a planning application which is eventually overturned by the Court of Appeal, that Council will be liable for all costs incurred by the applicant after this initial approval

### Six-year Bridgnorth chicken farm battle is over after landowner drops fight

Shropshire Council initially granted permission for the Footbridge Farm scheme but a legal battle ensued after TAG secured a judicial review.

The High Court upheld the council's decision in June 2018, but the group took its fight to the Court of Appeal which ruled in May 2019 that the planning permission should be quashed – meaning the application went back to the council to be decided again. When the scheme went before the southern planning committee in December 2021, members voted to refuse permission – going against the advice of planning officers. A six-year fight to stop an intensive chicken farm being built on the outskirts of Bridgnorth has ended in victory after the applicants confirmed they were dropping the plans. The owner of the land has decided not to challenge the decision.

The proposals would have seen four poultry units housing a total of 210,000 birds constructed at Footbridge Farm in Tasley, on land which is now likely to be used for housing as part of the planned 'garden village'.

The Footbridge Farm scheme was rejected by the council in 2021 and the decision was backed by a planning inspector last month, after an appeal by landowner Matthew Bower. Tasley Action Group (TAG), which was formed in 2017 after the plans were lodged, said it was the right decision as the application was "fundamentally flawed".

TAG spokesman and Tasley parish councillor George Edwards said: "It's been six very long, hard-fought years and we are absolutely delighted that this Footbridge Farm industrial poultry scheme has finally been laid to rest once and for all.

"Shropshire Council's planning officers should have binned this application right from the start – it was too close to housing, both existing and planned."

Mr Edwards said it was concerning that the council had accepted the applicant's odour assessment, but the planning inspectorate who heard the appeal later ruled it "could not be relied upon". This issue was put to the council's cabinet at a meeting last week in a public question by Dr Alison Caffyn, who researches the impacts of intensive poultry units in Herefordshire and Shropshire.

She asked how the council would respond to the inspector's concerns over the odour assessment – which was produced by the same company used by applicants behind plans for other intensive poultry units across Shropshire.

However the council said its own environmental protection team and consultancy firm – who were "experts" in the field – had judged that the modelling was fit for purpose.

Mr Edwards said this response showed council officers were "still unable to accept they got it wrong". He said it was now time for the council to take stock of the number of intensive farming units it has permitted across the county – and say enough is enough. For well over a decade, planning officers have been recommending applications for similar industrial livestock units and Shropshire now has more of them than any other county in England, all of which cumulatively pollute the environment with a progressive detrimental effect on people's health.

"Yet there has never been any statement from Shropshire Council spelling out precisely what the actual benefits are to Shropshire and its inhabitants from these clearly harmful developments imposed upon communities.

"The national press tells us that the true cost of industrial livestock farming is paid for by the environment, and that the whole model is not, nor has never been, sustainable. Whilst we firmly support British farmers and farming, this cannot be done at the expense of the very environment on which we all rely.

"Herefordshire has called for a moratorium on industrial livestock farming developments for these very reasons, and it is suggested Shropshire Council follow suit, particularly in the light of it having declared a climate emergency.

"Instead of supporting and approving yet more types of these developments, which threaten the environment and health and wellbeing of communities across the county, Shropshire Council's decision-makers should be supporting the transition of agriculture away from industrial livestock factory farming towards more diverse, sustainable and profitable farming methods."

**Tom Ryves writes - As an afternote,** the Council who originally agreed the application was required to compensate the applicant for the costs incurred in this first decision by the Council to support the application, such costs being those associated with building the units.

We should note that in the case of the Methwold factory farm application, which I think will be decided on environmental issues, our Council has appointed an well respected external consultant, Reading Agriculture Consultants (who normally act for applicants) who have pointed out that Cranswick have failed to satisfy Natural England on ammonia projections by just not providing the date, on the doubtful grounds that the application is for the continuation of an existing business. Cranswick, having cast aspersions on the competence of RAC have only one route left...to provide data to satisfy Natural England that the adjacent Special Protection Area is not at risk form the ammonia output of 6,000,000 chickens,

Our MP, the Hon Ms E Truss,MP, ex-PM, has failed completely to support our community as it challenges this major application, some suggesting her close relationship with the Managing Director of Cranswick might be a factor. Her only contribution to my knowledge has been to say that "the people need cheap food". We are all only too aware of the impact of factory farming on the quality of the chicken we consume and I would suggest that given the health crisis we all face (and I include myself in the obese category) what we need is healthy food. And that is what real farming is about, not this travesty.

My wishes for 2024 are a rejection of this appalling factory farm planning application and the replacement of Ms Truss by an MP who actually is interested in our lives and our problems and will understand and respond to our concerns

And if you hold Cranswick shares in your retirement portfolio now might be a good time to sell.

#### **WNAS March 2024**

Amanda Harrison, latter-day Amy Johnson, was our celebrity guest speaker this month. We say 'celebrity' because she has rubbed shoulders with the famous:- sports personalities, politicians, film stars and royalty, the latter being, in her own words, the least self-

opinionated and the least pretentious. The opportunity for this privilege resulted from becoming, later in her career, a commercial pilot instructor.

Her fascination for flying began when she was a schoolgirl. Her father and brother were both aero-modellers; the seed was sown; it germinated and, now she has her own full grown 1930s Tiger Moth in which she is re-enacting her hero's epic journey, some of it already completed. Much of Amanda's story is common knowledge and references to her achievements are well documented online. Her presentation at our meeting together with the book she has published help fill in the gaps in this incredible saga.

This vivacious but modest 46 year old trod the Mundford Bowls Club boards with confidence, humour and enthusiasm. It seemed, almost, as if she was enjoying the company of the WNAS as much as she does her beloved aeroplane.

There was an underlying message in her story that was not just about the thrill

of flying her own aeroplane but by how much the sensation was magnified by circumstances leading up to her success. Amanda wears her heart on her sleeve: as a teenager with few academic achievements and, being diagnosed with dyslexia, her peers regarded her as a 'no-hoper' destined for a career stacking shelves. Now, she seems to have another quest: to right some of the wrongs our education system has over-looked. She gives up some of her precious spare time to children with learning difficulties; to demonstrate that: 'where there's a will there's a way'. She encourages them into the belief that learning is exciting rather than a chore. #### Egrets in our countryside – a sign of changing times

25 years ago, I wouldn't have been able to write this article- as there had been very few records of any of our three, now common, egret species in the UK. The first species to make landfall on a regular basis was the Little egret- which turned up in significant numbers in 1989. This small, very elegant visitor was a novelty- with its pure white plumage, black bill, black legs and yellow feet. Like Grey herons, they could be found in wet places- ditches, pools and marshy areas, shining bright against a backdrop of browns and greens.

Lakenheath Fen's first record of a Little egret came on 25 April 2002- as part of their rapid northwards expansion from its breeding colonies in the south-west of the UK. Two years later, we hosted its much larger cousin, the Great white egret, for the first time on 25 January 2004. A large influx in 2007-2008 resulted in there being enough here at one time to persuade them to breed, in Somerset in 2008. Like the Little egret, it then expanded its range naturally and both species can today be seen every day on the reserve in good numbers. In Autumn 2023 for many weeks it was possible to see 40+ Little egret and 20+ Great white egret all enjoying a feast of large fish that had made their way into the Hockwold Washes through the inlet from the river Little Ouse. Most days, single figures of both species is more usual, but the high counts of last year really show us how many there now are in the local area.

Much more recently, in 2020, the first Cattle egret was spotted on the reserve- on 15 August. Fast forward to now, and in recent months we've had almost daily sightings of this species and 21 were spotted during a winter wetland bird count on 12 February this year. Cattle egrets are quite different in habits and behaviour from other egrets and herons, as they mostly associate with cattle and sheep- they feed on worms and other bugs turned over by their hooves, and also on ticks, flies and other pests attracted to the animals themselves.

The arrival of these three species of egret in the UK in the past 25 years is thought to be a result of a warming climate. Now, in our local area, it is quite possible to see all four species, including Grey heron, in one day if we keep an eye on ditches and pools and livestock grazing in wet places.






